

CHAPTER 4

IOWA TUITION GRANT PROGRAM

Not-For-Profit

Overview

The Iowa Tuition Grant (ITG) Program assists students who attend independent postsecondary institutions in Iowa. Iowa residents currently enrolled, or planning to enroll, for at least three semester hours at one of the eligible Iowa postsecondary institutions may apply. The statutory maximum award is set at \$4,000, although the maximum award set for an academic year may be less depending on the funding available and number of projected recipients. Grants may not exceed the difference between independent college and university tuition and mandatory fees and the average tuition and fees at the three public Regent universities.

Established: May, 1969

A. ELIGIBILITY

1. College and University

The Code of Iowa limits eligibility to Iowa colleges and universities that:

- Are accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges (NCA); and
- Are exempt from taxation under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; and
- Agree to provide institutional matching financial aid dollars as described in Iowa Code 261.9; or
- Are specialized colleges accredited by the NCA that offer health professional programs affiliated with health care systems in Iowa.

Each college or university must complete an application for participation in the Iowa Tuition Grant Program. College and university officials must submit the application and supporting documentation establishing accreditation or accreditation plans by January 1 prior to the application year in which they want to participate. If the college or university's application is approved, students at the college or university may begin submitting need analysis applications (FAFSAs) on the following January to apply for funds. In summary, if a college application is received prior to January 1 and approved, the earliest students attending that college could apply for Iowa Tuition Grant funding would be the following January 1.

Colleges and universities may lose eligibility for the Iowa Tuition Grant Program if NCA accreditation is lost or suspended or if the college or university is removed from NCA candidate status. College and university officials at colleges or universities that have NCA accreditation suspended or withdrawn by the NCA must notify the Commission immediately of the change in status.

Matching Funds Requirement

Each college or university must provide a matching amount of institutional financial aid. During academic year 2004-05, the first year of the match requirement, the match was set by the General Assembly at 75 percent of the amount received by the college or university's students for Iowa Tuition Grants. The match requirement increases each year by the percentage increase in the appropriation made by the General Assembly. During the 2010-11 academic year, the college or university match 91% percent. **Since the appropriation decreased in 2011-12, the college or university match will remain at 91%.** The required match will not exceed 100 percent of the amount provided to students under the Iowa Tuition Grant Program. College and university officials must provide information concerning matching dollars at the end of each academic year. Failure to meet the match will cause a college or university to become ineligible for participation beginning the next academic year.

When reporting matching funds, colleges and universities should include all institutional funds that are included on an ITG recipient's financial aid award as institutional matching dollars. If work-study funding is being reported as matching dollars, only the portion of work-study payment that is institutional dollars may be included – no federal or state dollars may be included in the college or university matching funds. The institutional match should include matching funds provided to students during terms in which the students are eligible to receive Iowa Tuition Grant awards. Summer dollars should be included only if the student is eligible for an Iowa Tuition Grant during the summer term.

Students attending the colleges and universities listed on the following table are eligible to receive Iowa Tuition Grant awards.

2. Student

In addition to the general student eligibility requirements found in Chapter 1, an eligible Iowa Tuition Grant recipient must be currently enrolled or planning to enroll at least part-time (3 hours minimum) in an undergraduate degree program at an eligible Iowa college or university. Neither certificates nor diplomas are considered to be degrees. Only students enrolled in associate or bachelors' degree programs meet the criteria as being enrolled in degree seeking programs.

Eligible full-time students may receive up to 8 semesters (or the quarter equivalent) of Iowa Tuition Grant assistance. Part-time students may receive up to 16 semesters (or the quarter equivalent) in assistance.

Students studying abroad through home institutions in Iowa are eligible, as long as they:

- Are enrolled at an eligible home institution,
- Receive credit from that home institution, and
- Pay tuition and fees at the home institution.

B. APPLICATION PROCESS

Students must file Free Applications for Federal Student Aid (FAFSAs) as described in Chapter 1.

C. SELECTION OF RECIPIENTS

Grants are awarded to eligible students by college and university officials to on-time applicants (those meeting the Commission's July 1 priority deadline) whose EFC levels are at or below the parameter defined by the Commission. The Application Receipt Date on the student's Institutional Student Information Record (ISIR) MUST indicate that the student met the priority filing deadline. **For the 2011-12 academic year, the FAFSA filing deadline was extended to September 1, 2011. The EFC level for the Iowa Tuition Grant Program for private, colleges and universities for the 2011-12 academic year is \$13,500.**

Students with Bachelors' degrees may receive Iowa Tuition Grants if they enroll in undergraduate degree programs to receive additional Bachelors' degrees. Students seeking teacher certification may receive Iowa Tuition Grants. Teachers who are already certified and who are seeking additional endorsements are not eligible to receive Iowa Tuition Grants.

In no case may a student exceed the 8 semester award maximum (16 semesters for part-time students).

D. AWARD AMOUNTS AND LIMITS

With the exception of approved accelerated courses of study, Iowa Tuition Grants are provided only during the traditional 9-month academic year generally defined as September through May. This policy is designed to ensure that students will be eligible to receive Iowa Tuition Grants throughout their undergraduate programs. If awards were provided through the summer term, students could exhaust their 8 semesters of eligibility prior to graduation. Excluding summer term attendance also helps maximize the value of the limited annual appropriation.

Iowa Tuition Grant awards are tuition-restricted in nature. When awarded in combination with other tuition-restricted funds, total tuition-restricted funding that includes an Iowa Tuition Grant cannot exceed total tuition and mandatory fees charged to the recipient. In most cases, the Iowa Tuition Grant award is reduced to comply with this policy. For recipients of Chapter 33 veterans education tuition payments, the Iowa Tuition Grant award can be applied to tuition and mandatory fees prior to the calculation of the Chapter 33 tuition/fee award (guidance established 6/23/11).

The statutory maximum annual (two semesters) Iowa Tuition Grant is set by the Iowa Legislature. The Commission sets the actual amount of the Grant to be awarded for each academic year, and student awards may not exceed the lesser of the academic year's Grant amount, or a student's tuition and mandatory fees less the average tuition and fees paid by a Regent student taking the same number of hours over the equivalent of two semesters. **Since the program is designed to offset the higher tuition at private institutions, special care is taken to ensure that no recipient receives ITG assistance that makes a private college program less expensive than a comparable program at a Regent university.** Other state-funded programs are not subject to this requirement.

The maximum Iowa Tuition Grant for academic year 2011-12 is **\$3,500** for students attending independent not-for-profit colleges and universities.

When calculating Iowa Tuition Grants (ITG) for students, college and university officials must use the Regent universities' average tuition and fees. For academic year 2011-12, the average tuition and fees for full-time students equals **\$7,534**. The average tuition charge for part-time enrollment is **\$268** per credit hour.

Independent Not-for-profit Colleges and Universities. The following calculations are provided specifically for use by independent not-for-profit colleges and universities.

To calculate an ITG for a full-time student, college and university officials must use the following calculation:

Full-time Tuition Cost - **\$7,534** = Maximum ITG Award Or
\$3,500 (whichever is less)

The statutory maximum ITG is \$4,000. The maximum ITG award for academic year 2011-12 has been set at **\$3,500**, and awards may not exceed the lesser of this maximum amount or the student's calculated need.

To calculate an ITG for a part-time student, use actual credit hour costs and subtract the Regent cost for the identical hours:

$$\text{Part-time Tuition Cost} - \text{Regent Part-time Cost} = \text{Maximum ITG Award}$$

The following chart provides the maximum ITG award allowed per credit hour of enrollment based on a maximum annual award of **\$3,500**.

In all cases, the Regents' applicable tuition charges for part-time enrollment must be subtracted from the part-time student's tuition costs.

E. ACCELERATED SUMMER PROGRAMS

Students enrolled in “accelerated” academic programs may be eligible for summer Iowa Tuition Grants. Accelerated programs are those programs that allow students to complete a traditional four year baccalaureate degree program in less than the normal prescribed time period. An accelerated program may be defined for a set group of students or may be a self-directed program for which students have received approval from appropriate college or university officials.

College and university officials are required to submit applications to the Commission that define the manner in which the summer Iowa Tuition Grant Program is to be administered. Applications can be requested through the Information Service Center at 877-272-4456. College and university officials must contact the Commission before January 1 prior to the year in which they want to participate (ex: if a college is applying for summer Iowa Tuition Grant eligibility for the summer of 2015, the Commission must receive the application by January 1, 2014).

The application must clearly identify students participating in qualified summer programs, provide descriptions of the programs, and include estimates of the number of students expected to qualify for summer Iowa Tuition Grant assistance. The application must also provide tracking mechanisms to ensure awards are only made to students completing coursework at an accelerated pace, and to ensure that these students will not receive their maximum Iowa Tuition Grant eligibility prior to degree completion. Commission staff will review the materials and notify college and university officials of the status of applications. College and university officials may not make summer awards until authorization from the Commission is received.

Students who will graduate on an accelerated schedule and who are attending the colleges and universities listed on the following table currently are eligible to receive summer Iowa Tuition Grants.

Summer Iowa Tuition Grant recipients may receive up to the full semester grant amount for the summer term. Summer payments are counted as full semesters toward the 8 semester maximum eligibility for full-time students. Students who will graduate on an accelerated schedule must not receive 8 full semesters of grants prior to graduation. The maximum full-time award for a summer semester is one-half of the maximum annual Iowa Tuition Grant award from the prior academic year. The maximum full-time award for a summer quarter is one-third of the maximum annual Iowa Tuition Grant award from the prior academic year.

F. OFF-CAMPUS CENTER AWARDS

Several independent colleges and universities operate off-campus centers with nontraditional calendars. Award procedures for these students are designed to provide maximum Iowa Tuition Grant benefit within the statutory limitations (eight semesters of assistance, statutory maximum, and Regent differential). Maximum awards for these students are calculated in accordance with the preceding calculations for part-time students until the student reaches 30 credit hours during a single academic year. At 30 credit hours, student awards are adjusted to the maximum full-time annual ITG award. This predominantly addresses disbursements for colleges with three sets of two eight-week modular programs (6 modules), five of which are within the traditional academic year (and eligible for state funding).

Example -- Off-Campus Center ITG Calculation:

School's tuition = \$265 per hour

School's fall through spring calendar includes 5 terms

Full Time Equivalent = 6 hours (30 hours ÷ 5 terms)

Students attending 6 hours receive maximum ITG benefit

Students attending less than 6 hours receive part-time equivalent benefit

The following table shows the award calculation for terms 1 and 2 during which the student takes 6 hours each term. Please note that students can be paid for more than 6 credit hours in a given term (ex: if the student is enrolled for 9 credit hours in the term, the student can be paid for those 9 credit hours using the same calculation technique below), although the maximum annual award is based on 30 credit hours of enrollment. Therefore, a student enrolled at an off-campus center cannot be paid for more than 30 credit hours in an academic year.

Tuition for 6 hours @ \$285	\$1,710

During terms 3 and 4, the student takes 5 credit hours in each term. The following table shows the award calculation for terms 3 and 4.

Tuition for 5 hours @ \$285	\$1,425

During term 5, the student takes 8 hours and reaches 30 total credit hours and is converted to full-time ITG eligibility. Since this student has reached 30 credit hours during the academic year, he/she has also reached the maximum ITG award under off-center campus awarding.

This student's total ITG for the year is \$1,016.

*When calculating Iowa Tuition Grant (ITG) awards for students for the 2011-12 academic year, schools use the Regent institutions' average tuition and fees of \$7,534 for full-time students. The Regent tuition charge for part-time enrollment is \$268 per credit hour.

Regent part-time fee is used for up to 11 credit hours. Regent average is used for 12 or more credit hours.

If this same student takes 10 hours during term 5, the Regent's hourly rate would drop and the student's ITG award would increase as shown below:

In this scenario, this student's total ITG for the year is \$1,586.

When calculating Iowa Tuition Grant (ITG) awards for students for the 2011-12 academic year, schools use the Regent institutions' average tuition and fees of \$7,534 for full-time students. The Regent tuition charge for part-time enrollment is \$268 per credit hour.

Regent part-time fee is used for up to 11 credit hours. Regent average is used for 12 or more credit hours.

G. AWARD NOTIFICATION

College and university officials should provide award notices to all Iowa Tuition Grant recipients. Award notices must clearly indicate award amounts and the state programs from which students will receive funding. All notices concerning state grants must include the following award notification statement:

“In the event that available state funds are insufficient to pay the full amount of each approved grant, the Iowa College Student Aid Commission has the authority to administratively reduce the award.”

H. RENEWAL ELIGIBILITY

Financial need is determined annually on the basis of a new FAFSA filed by the applicant. Eligible Iowa students may be considered for subsequent awards if the students continue to meet Commission eligibility requirements and have not reached cumulative Iowa Tuition Grant eligibility.

Applicants with prior undergraduate degrees may be considered for Iowa Tuition Grants if the applicants are eligible Iowa resident students, meet eligibility criteria, and are enrolling in a completely different undergraduate degree program.

Under no circumstances may full-time students receive more than 8 semesters (or the quarter equivalent) of Iowa Tuition Grant assistance. Part-time students may receive no more than 16 semesters (or the quarter equivalent) of assistance. Students may receive combinations of full- and part-time awards to reach maximum eligibility. When calculating combined full- and part-time eligibility, one full-time semester will be counted as two part-time semesters. Conversely, two part-time semesters will be counted as one full-time semester.

College and university officials who need assistance in determining whether a student has reached maximum eligibility should contact the Commission.

I. DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS

Chapter 3 provides a complete description of the payment process.

Iowa Tuition Grant payments may be used only to pay students' tuition and mandatory fees.

J. CHANGES/CORRECTIONS

Any changes in awards must be provided to Commission staff electronically via the State Scholarship and Grant Reporting System (see Chapter 3).

K. VERIFICATION/COMPLIANCE

College and university officials are responsible for completing any required federal verification procedures and for coordinating all aid to ensure compliance with student eligibility and allowable award amounts.

For students selected for federal verification, disbursements of state-funded student financial aid may be made prior to completing the verification process as long as college or university officials have no reason to believe application information is inaccurate. If students become ineligible for aid due to verification activities, refunds must be made to state-funded programs.
